## LOST POCKET BOOKS.

### Some Ladies were Fortunate Enough to Recover Them.

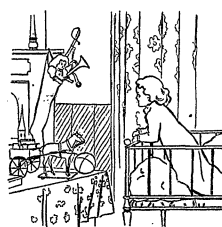
